Course Description

Some of the finest objects in the Wallace Collection were originally made for the Palace of Versailles. This year, as we celebrate the 400th birthday of Europe's most iconic royal palace, uncover its fascinating and complex history. We'll learn about the chateau's architectural and stylistic development, and how it was luxuriously furnished with precious products from the royal manufactures.

Taking a tantalising glimpse into the magnificent state receptions, organised to welcome and awe foreign ambassadors, we'll also consider Versailles' political role as the architectural embodiment of royal power. You'll gain fascinating insights into how the palace operated, and into the daily lives of the kings, queens, royal mistresses and courtiers who inhabited it.

Session One: Power and Magnificence - Versailles under Louis XIV

In our first session, we'll examine the transformation of Versailles from a modest hunting lodge to a grand baroque palace, which became the supreme symbol of royal power. Focusing on the reign of Louis XIV, we'll understand the role of the architects and designers who devised the chateau's luxurious decors and furnishings, and also discuss Versailles' lavish gardens and exotic menagerie.

Session Two: Precious Elegance - Versailles in the 18th Century

Moving away from the pomp and splendour of Louis XIV's reign, in our second session we'll focus on the private apartments created for Louis XV and Marie-Antoinette. Intimate private retreats, we'll see how these rooms were furnished with the utmost elegance and refinement, reflecting contemporary fashion. We'll also consider the Petit Trianon and its gardens – Marie-Antoinette's private refuge, which provided escape from the strict courtly etiquette.

Course Tutor

Barbara is Senior Lecturer in History of Art and Design at Sotheby's Institute of Art in London. Prior to her academic career, Barbara held curatorial positions at the V&A Wellcome Trust and the National Maritime Museum. Barbara has published on the subject of French decorative arts, the history of taste and the history of collecting. Her research interests include the production and consumption of French decorative arts, 1650-1900.

Previous Skills, Knowledge or Experience

None required. This course is designed as an introduction to the subject.
