Course Description

Described as unique and visionary by critics during his lifetime, Joseph Mallord William Turner (1775-1851) is perhaps our most beloved English Romantic painter. Taking the Wallace Collection's small number of dynamic watercolours as a starting point, explore the ways in which Turner was stimulated by the modern world and how this manifested in his paintings.

We'll look at the artists who influenced Turner, and against whom he measured his work, and examine how his relationships with friends and patrons contributed to his artistic development. We'll also consider how Turner was inspired by contemporary aesthetic ideas, as well as by the dramatic and irrevocable changes brought on by industrialisation and commercialisation during his lifetime.

Session One: Competition, Influences, Friends and Patrons

How did artists of the past inspire Turner as a young man? In our first session, we'll look at the impact of artists including Watteau, the Van de Veldes, Rembrandt and above all Claude Lorrain. We'll learn how Turner emulated and then sought to surpass their examples. Although he was a private and personal person, Turner could also be a loyal and devoted friend. We'll learn about some of the significant relationships in his life and how they helped to shape his work.

Session Two: JMW Turner and the Impact of the Sublime

What do we mean by the 'sublime' in the 18th-century sense of the term? In our second session, we'll discuss its definition and learn how the sublime radically alters Turner's approach to landscape painting, opening up the possibility for some of his greatest works. During Turner's lifetime, many people were wary of advances in industry and science as well as changes in society, particularly urbanisation. We'll investigate how Turner manipulated these contemporary concerns and, by fusing them with the sublime, how he produced his most audacious responses to modern life.

Course Tutor

Dr Matthew Morgan is Museum Director of Turner's House in Twickenham and an Associate Lecturer at Birkbeck, University of London. He has worked in the heritage sector for 10 years, including at the Royal Collection and the National Gallery. Prior to that he was a Director at Christie's. He has taught diverse audiences across the UK, as well as making a series of short films which can be seen on YouTube.

Previous Skills, Knowledge or Experience

None required. This course is designed as an introduction to the subject.
